AAUW Convention – 2015 in San Diego

It was an exciting few days in June when San Diego welcomed more than 1,000 members to the AAUW National Convention of 2015. Leadership was emphasized throughout the convention.

Texas attendees numbered approximately 50 members. There were many speakers and even more workshops and special events. Malinda Gaul, Karen Reichensperger, and Mynda Holman McGuire tried to take it all in. One of the highlights of the convention was a plenary session, moderated by Marianne Schnail, on "How to encourage more women to become leaders."

Panel participants were Noorjahan Akbar, Kate C. Farrar, Lilly Ledbetter, and Don McPherson. Akbar who is a native of Afghanistan noted that women in the U.S. do not face violence and terrorist attacks as they do in a war zone, but they do suffer vicious mental and emotional attacks. "Differences are in the symptoms of misogyny. The roots remain the same. If you dare to speak up, [they say] we'll bring up your sexual history…it's not equal to violence, but it is a threat, and it silences women."



"Our systems and governments were put into place a hundred years ago by white, heterosexual men," said former NFL player and anti-domestic violence activist McPherson. "And then they call it a meritocracy, but everything is based on their lens." We're still living in a model of leadership where if I win, you lose, he said, but women can see beyond that binary, and that's what makes their model of leadership so promising, but also so necessary. He advised women to be patient and willing to educate men and for men to be humble and willing to listen. "Because of my background, I see the other side of this all-male environment. That makes me very discouraged," said McPherson. "At the same time, I hear [Akbar] speak, and I'm good. We all have our problems, but she just said, 'I come from a war zone!""

Kate Farrar, an AAUW Consultant, supports women's representation in politics. She serves as president of the only nonpartisan PAC in the country that supports young women running for office. She pointed out that if women want equity they must strive to elect more women to public office to achieve true representation of our goals.

Lilly Ledbetter, who has become the "Face of pay equity," has devoted her life to making it easier for women who have been victims of financial gender bias to get justice. Financial justice was denied to her when the Supreme Court ruled for her former employer, Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company. Congress passed a bill to stop what had happened to her with the "Lilly Ledbetter Act." It was the first bill President Barack Obama signed on his first day in office. Since then Ledbetter has responded with a renewed effort to make pay equity for women a reality.

There were three award winning speakers at the Banquet. They included artist Faith Ringgold who received the 2015 Alumnae Recognition Award. During her acceptance speech she said, "I'm 84 and will continue to be a force in the art world, where women are underrepresented." She also encouraged members to blaze different paths to leadership especially in politics and religion. She added that women will use words instead of violence to solve problems, and that's the kind of leadership the world needs.

The Achievement Award winner was Maria Klawe who swapped her presidency of Princeton University for that of Harvey Mudd College. She said that her friends frankly thought she was crazy. In just a few years, she has now transformed Harvey Mudd into an institution that has made strides in the technical education of women. For example, 38 percent of their computer science graduate program consists of women. The Eleanor Roosevelt Award winner, University of Georgia Professor Juanita Johnson-Bailey, has a remarkable history as an example of a woman who pulled herself up from poverty. She achieved all her

She now works to inspire her students by challenging them to be aware of their surroundings while taking on the task of envisioning and creating a better future for themselves and others.

Malinda Gaul was re-elected as an AAUW Director, and now also serves on the National Executive Committee. There were many workshops and their details can be found on the AAUW.org website, along with other details of the convention.

Mynda attended three workshops. They were "Marketing your Branch from A to Z," "How Washington Works, a Policy Update," and "What Stories are Under Your Bed? How to Preserve your AAUW State and Branch Historical Collections." If you are interested in any of these topics, she has written summaries that she will send to you via email. 


Leader Named Assistant Principal of the Year by TASSP

When Dr. Caprica Wells, Assistant Principal at Lee High School, spoke at our February meeting about empowering young women at school and through her Red Diamonds Conference, we were mesmerized. Many of us voiced the opinion that Caprica should be on the national speaking circuit. Our group is not alone in recognizing this outstanding leader. The Texas Association of Secondary School Principals (TASSP) has named Dr. Wells as the 2015-2016 Outstanding High School Assistant Principal of the Year. She has been a part of the Lee leadership team since 2006.

School administrators are nominated and chosen by their peers within the organization. Nominations are based upon exemplary performance and outstanding leadership. Dr. Wells will be honored in June 2016 in Austin at the Josten's Night of Heroes prior to the TASSP Summer Conference.

If selected as a state winner by the TASSP Principal's Image Committee, Dr. Wells will advance to compete in the NASSP National Assistant Principal of the Year Award.



Student Leader Continues Preparations to Make a Positive Difference

Who could forget Paige Johnson, the high school sophomore at the International School of the Americans in NEISD, who spoke to the Branch in December?

She told of her goal to make a difference in our country through elected office. Since then she has continued to hone her skills in the arenas of public service and politics.

Paige served a term as City Council District 10's representative to the San Antonio Youth Commission and became an intern in the District 10 office this summer. Creating press releases and carrying out policy analysis were among her duties.

In July, Paige was a State Department Youth Ambassador, spending a week in Washington, DC, and three weeks in Colombia. In Bogota and Barranquilla she stayed with local families and engaged with teens there to perform community service, meet with community leaders, and participate in team-building exercises.

And that's not all--Paige and her fellow Youth Ambassadors will apply what they've learned to implement projects serving identified needs in their own communities.
