


Did You Know?

Christy Woodward Kaupert

"Long Shadows: Twenty Years After the Year of the Woman"

If you are intrigued by this title, then you'll definitely want to hear what this month's Featured Speaker, Christy Woodward Kaupert, has to say. In her presentation, the Professor of Political Science and Public Policy at San Antonio College will compare the high hopes we had for the 24 women elected to Congress in 1992 to our expectations for the "Class of 2014" when a record-breaking 104 women were elected.

In Professor Kaupert's words, "This presentation will reexamine the research done almost twenty-five years ago with an eye on where women are today...Feminist scholars have long argued that women are needed 'at the table' to bring attention to and craft policy that is often ignored by their male contemporaries, particularly policies that focus on the lives of women, children and families...The question remains, do women make a difference in legislative bodies?"

AAUW SA Hosting State Convention

AAUW SA is stepping into action in a big way this spring when we host the 47th Biennial State Convention here in the Mission City on Friday and Saturday, April 29 and 30, and Sunday, May 1.

If you have never attended a state convention, do not miss this opportunity. Join Mayor Ivy Taylor in welcoming the attendees to San Antonio on Saturday morning. The theme of the convention: Step Into Action With AAUW runs through all the workshops and presentations. The opening session addresses the question: Why So Few Women In Politics? with a panel of women politicians. Workshops include how to take action on the issues of equal pay, human trafficking, immigration, diversity, and social media. The convention closes on Sunday with two generations of Andrades. Former Texas Secretary of State Hope Andrade will introduce her daughter-in-law Leticia Andrade the rising star executive from CST Brands (CornerStore). This year's convention promises to have plenty of interesting ideas by and for women.

The convention also offers lots of fun – starting with a reception on Friday night at the Hyatt Place and meals on Saturday, which are included in the registration price. Early Bird Registration of \$199 is available through March 30th.

The new Norris Conference Center, where the convention will take place, is located in the Park North shopping area. It is beautiful, and their food prepared on site is delicious! Parking is free at the Norris Center. The convention hotel is the Hyatt Place on Hwy 281 near The Quarry. A free hotel shuttle will take guests to the Norris Center and to the Quarry.

Member Spotlight



Virginia Wong

Three Master's degrees! Three Fulbright Scholarships! Yes, we do have a Branch member who has accomplished this and more. Virginia Wong is an extraordinary woman living an extraordinary life!

Virginia was awarded her first Fulbright while an undergrad at Trinity. She went to Russia, spending time in Sochi, the resort city on the part of the Black Sea known as the Caucasian Riviera. (If Sochi sounds familiar, that is because it was the site of the 2014 Winter Olympics.) During this time, Virginia also traveled to Rome.

Her second Fulbright came through Texas AM, and again, she went to Russia. A side trip to India found her meeting Indira Ghandi and Mother Teresa. Merely Sister Teresa at that time, the nun who was later to win the Nobel Peace Prize, had already established her orphanage in Delhi, and Virginia was able to tour the facility, an island of antiseptic cleanliness in the midst of great squalor. She was struck by the sight of a group of young girls from the Sorbonne rocking the babies.

China was the destination of Virginia's third Fulbright. There she climbed the Great Wall in a remote region where the real "Forbidden City" is located. True to the spirit of the Scholarships, Virginia interacted with the occupants of every country she visited, for the aim of the Fulbrights is to promote better understanding between the people of the United States and the citizens of other countries throughout the world.

After obtaining her Bachelor's degree in Education, Virginia set about earning those MA's-- all while raising three children and working at the family store, Tex' Food Center. She taught History and English in the South San and the North East Districts.

Later, Virginia worked at the TEA Region 20 Education Service Center and became quite adept at writing grant proposals. She is proud to have written a grant that garnered \$350,000 for the Center.

As if that weren't enough, Virginia also climbs mountains, having scaled peaks in every major range of the world except the Alps.

Virginia is an avid collector of Chinese art, and her family's acquisitions of sculpture and paintings has been exhibited at the San Antonio Central Library and at the San Antonio Museum of Art. She is quite the Chinese chef, too, and taught Chinese cooking at Southwest Crafts School.

Virginia writes for fun, plays mahjong, paints, dabbles in photography, and reads for pleasure. Her favorite author is--who else?--Amy Tan. She still writes grants; her latest was for the Fire Museum in San Antonio.

If you are lucky enough to sit by Virginia Wong at any of our monthly meetings, you will find a fascinating conversationalist with a wealth of experiences to share. Ask her about the overly-friendly police chief in Rome, her swim in the Ganges River, or the secret money tree in China.
