AAUW-SA Supports Founders Day

AAUW-SA is almost 108 years old and has contributed to San Antonio throughout since its inception. Branch members have always actively supported women, children and education. For example, they helped start kindergartens, playgrounds and a free clinic in 1910. The Branch worked for compulsory school attendance starting in 1911, and "saved" the floundering San Antonio College from closing in its second year (1926) when members offered to fund it for \$11,000. The Branch brought poets William Butler Keats (1920) and Robert Frost (1922), among others, to San Antonio audiences as part of their earliest fundraisers. Their first scholarship was a "loan" of \$200 for a girl to attend UT.

Most of those early years were highlighted by annual College Career Days for all graduating high school girls in the city. During Fiesta 1923 AAUW's float led the night parade that included floats from all colleges and universities in Texas. In the late 1920s AAUW members approached Mayor John Tobin with a proposal to start a San Antonio Museum which resulted in The Witte. Our branch has been a presence leading to positive change for more than a century and our accomplishments continue now and into the future.

Member Spotlight



Dr. Nancy Fix Anderson

We have Hurricane Katrina to thank for blowing Dr. Nancy Fix Anderson to San Antonio ten years ago! She and her husband retired a year earlier than planned, discovered the city's wonderful museums, classical music venues, and hiking trails and never looked back.

This ardent student of women's history and women's rights, grew up in Dallas, attended an all-girls' school there, went on to Stanford as an undergraduate, earned her Master's at University of California-Irvine, and obtained her PhD from Tulane. She feels those early school years among girls gave her self confidence and shaped her belief that women could achieve. At Stanford, Nancy reveled in new ideas and ways of thinking. Even though university women still had a dress code and restrictive hours, she loved the social freedom there. Later in graduate school during the 70's and 80's, she championed the new wave of feminism--academic, political, and personal.

The over-arching theme of Nancy's graduate work can be described as women's history--hand in hand with women's rights and suffrage. Switching her interest from Victorian English history to the women's movement in England during the same time period, would provide a career focus and establish Dr. Nancy Fix Anderson as a ranking scholar in the field. Books she has authored on the subject include Women Against Women in Victorian England: A Life of Eliza Lynn Linton and Annie Besant in The Lives of Victorian Political Figures series.

On completion of her PhD, Nancy was employed by Loyola University, New Orleans, as an associate professor of history and was tapped as one of three women to start the Women's Studies Program there. It was to become a model for other programs instituted at the school. Nancy was invited back to Loyola to speak at the twentieth anniversary of the program and was highly gratified to reconnect with alumnae whom she had taught and mentored.

At the same time Nancy embarked on her academic career, she was enthusiastically working as a member of the National Women's Political Caucus to promote the election of women to government office and to help attain passage of the Equal Rights Amendment in Louisiana in 1972.

With such a full life, you would not think that she could find time to hike the trails of Europe and the United States, but Nancy has become a fervent fan of walkabouts over the years. She has even trekked the Camino de Santiago de Compostela over one hundred miles across the spine of Spain--twice! And right now she is hiking the fjiords of Norway. It's no surprise that she is founder of our Branch walking group Wandering Wonders, or that she leads Sierra Club hikes at Friedrich Park.

Nancy will teach A History of the Olympic Games course at ALIR this spring. Victorian sports are also among her interests and became the subject of yet another of her books--The Sporting Life: Victorian Sports and Games, in the Victorian Life and Times series. This fall, she will introduce a course, Militant Women, on British suffragettes. By a happy coincidence, the film "Suffragette," starring Meryl Streep and Carey Mulligan, will be seen in movie theaters starting October 23. That sounds like the best kind of homework assignment.

As you can see, Nancy Fix Anderson has always championed for women and girls. Through political activism in feminism's Second Wave, to support of Planned Parenthood, to teaching the history of women's struggles for rights and recognition, she has stepped into action for us all--her way.
