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From the President

Greetings!

First things first. I want to encourage you—to exhort you—to vote in the primary on March 6. Early voting is February 20 through March 2. Texas has one of the lowest primary turnout rates in the nation. Do your part to turn that around. Then, remember to think of AAUW's mission—enhancing equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, research, and philanthropy when you do vote.

- We need greater access to education by protecting Title IV (federal student financial aid funds) and Title IX (protects people from discrimination based on sex in education programs or activities that receive federal financial assistance), and enhancing female participation in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math).
- We need economic security by lessening the pay gap (moved up to 80 percent, hurrah?) and enhancing other equities in the workplace (on average, women in the workplace are promoted at a lower rate than men. The biggest gender gap is at the first step up to manager. Entry-level women are 18 percent less likely to be promoted than their male peers).
- We need more women in leadership (look at what is going on in Congress as I write this, and probably still as you read this) and protect Title VII (civil rights).

So, VOTE!

I just finished reading The Firebrand and the First Lady by AAUW American Fellow, Patricia Bell-Scott. The firebrand is Patti Murray and the first lady is Eleanor Roosevelt. In many ways, I would like to be as dedicated as they were to human rights, civil rights, women's rights, peace, and economic justice. I am thankful for them. Dedication takes so many sacrifices and such talent and commitment.

Admittedly, so much gets in the way. However, each one of us can do something in our own way to make this world, this nation better for women and girls. I try not to lose heart. Join me in keeping up the effort. Vote, write, speak, encourage, show gratitude, mentor, and raise your hand to be counted.

Together we can make progress!

Celebrating Women's History Month in Our 110th Year

Were you around when our first president graduated from Cornell in 1900? Or earlier,

when our third president graduated in Mississippi in 1898? (To still be around would be remarkable, as you would be about 140 years old, or older).

Regardless of your age, March's program will take you back through the decades, celebrating what our fore-mothers did for this branch, AAUW, this state, and our community. Our early pioneering branch members were among the very few college educated women in San Antonio in 1908. As such, they firmly believed they should give back selflessly to this community.

These remarkable women were activists, suffragists, teachers, lifelong students, committed community helpers, and more. This organization enabled them, along with other local women's organizations, to bring higher education, libraries, clinics, parks, museums, lecturers, and music to San Antonio.

In addition to working to improve schools and higher education, they started a kindergarten and fought for compulsory grade school state-wide. They also fought some remarkable battles with a local school board, and were credited for "Saving SAC" when that community college was set to close after only one year of existence.

Public Policy

With the president's state of the union message in January, it is especially important that AAUW members focus on how the president will address (with action) our public policy priorities. Through our actions, we must continue to advocate for policies that advance gender equity.

- Education: Protect Title IX and its commitment to equity in education. We must stand as an AAUW body to keep Title IX strong. STEM education must be strengthened and specifically funded with a focus on young girls. We must stand up for civil rights by opposing the advancement of candidates like Kenneth Marcus, nominated for Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights in the Department of Education, with his history of supporting sex segregation in public schools and lack of support for Title IX. Three civil rights groups have already filed suit in January against Secretary of Education, Betsy Devos and her rollback of Title IX guidance and regulations.
- The Federal Budget: Support programs that are critical to women and families' economic security, education, and civil rights. We need to stand together to urge Congress to pass a budget—one that supports women and families. The gender pay gap needs to be closed by enacting legislation to ensure equal pay for equal work. The Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA) must be expanded to cover the 40% of workers it does not currently cover, and all FMLA leave needs to be paid leave.
- Immigration: Stand up for the rights of young immigrants and continue to push Congress to pass a clean DREAM Act.
- Health Care: All Americans need access to quality, affordable health insurance. AAUW must be a voice in telling Congress not to repeal the Affordable Care Act.

Our activism is needed now more than ever at the local, state, and national levels. 2018 is our opportunity to vote for candidates that support AAUW priorities. Research the candidates, what they stand for, and how they have voted as representatives in our government. For a rundown of candidates, election dates, and sample ballots, see <u>ballotpedia.org</u>. Texas primaries are March 6, 2018, with early voting from February 20 through March 2, 2018.
