Our Branch has heard about and participated in many advocacy efforts through our meetings and projects this year thanks to Alicia. We have connected with a number of other groups that advocate for women and girls like League of Women Voters, Can We Talk?, Younger Women's Task Force. Scholarships have been awarded to 9 deserving young women who will follow in our footsteps and, hopefully, take over for us one of these days. Our Branch has been represented on Texas AAUW Board of Directors (Gayna and Malinda) and national AAUW Board of Directors (Malinda) and a national committee (Karen).

Our Title IX contacts to higher education facilities in San Antonio are in process as are plans to celebrate their efforts at a Stars basketball game this summer. Texas Lobby Day at the Capitol was energizing and enlightening, enlightening to realize that Texas still has such barriers to equity for women and girls. All the states around Texas have higher minimum wages than we have, yet our legislators are keeping 60% of our women at lower than poverty hourly wages. Much work still to do. We need to get the vote out to make changes to the legislature.

St. Mary's University has expressed an interest in knowing more about AAUW so we will meet with them. I'm hoping that they will decide to become a College/University member. Many opportunities will be opened to their students. I'd like to foster that next year with Our Lady of the Lake, San Antonio College and Palo Alto who have been College/University members.

Besides all this, the interest groups will be making plans for next year. It is honestly exciting to see how many opportunities we have for our members. Do recruit others and pay your dues—if you have not already done so—to be eligible for the Early Bird drawing at the May meeting for a year of free membership AND continued service, learning, fun and fellowship.

2016-2017 SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarship recipients and their guests were celebrated at a luncheon at Los Patios on April 1st.

The Branch raised funds and were able to grant six textbook scholarships. Andrea Smith and Jemima Baca—both baccalaureate students at St. Mary's—each received a \$500 Helen Aude textbook scholarship. Other \$500 textbook scholarship recipients were Ashley Hass, seeking an MBA at St. Mary's; Yolanda Martinez in the Doctor of Pharmacology program at UIW; Megan Uhlig, earning a baccalaureate in industrial engineering at St. Mary's; and Vy Nguyen, a baccalaureate student in biology at St. Mary's.

The interest from endowed funds was used to grant three \$2,000 graduate scholarships. The recipients were Sarah Kane, working on a masters degree as a nurse practitioner at UTHC; Jiyoung Moon in the doctoral counseling program at St. Mary's; and Shannon Sanchez, also working on a masters degree as a nurse practitioner at UTHC.

All these young women are the "cream of the crop." They are following in our footsteps, they will be working with us, and they will take over where we leave off. CONGRATUALATIONS to these women and to the branch for the support of these scholarships!

Women's hockey came to a four-year agreement with USA Hockey to grant them what they consider a reasonable wage that would align their equipment, travel, and benefits arrangements more closely with that of the men's teams. The agreement includes payment outside of the six-month Olympic period, up to \$129,000 if they win Olympic gold, and more development of the game for women. This is a reminder of the building momentum for, and appreciation of, women's sport across the nation and the world.

A Title IX victory! National AAUW is working to identify and preserve Title IX. To that end, AAUW has worked with the Department of Education on resource material for the coordinators which is available on the AAUW web site.

One of AAUW TX's Goals is to identify all higher education Title IX Coordinators in Texas and honor those doing a great job. In support of this common goal, ten volunteers from AAUW-San Antonio are contacting higher ed. facilities in San Antonio and

- 1. Asking for the Title IX coordinator to see if the school knows who it is, even though we have their names.
- 2. Either way, we then talk to that person, introduce ourselves, the reason we are calling, a bit about AAUW, etc.
- 3. See if they have any questions about Title IX.
- 4. Ask them if they have the resource material; if not, the caller will send them the links.
- 5. Tell them that we are arranging a celebration this summer with the San Antonio Stars and they will be our guests. More information will be coming.
- 6. Thank them for doing what they can do for gender equity.

We can expand this celebration outside of San Antonio to contiguous counties with your help. Please let Karen Reichensperger (210-637 -0170, jkreichen@att.net) know if you are willing to contact 3-5 schools. Contact information and resources will be provided to you.
