It's My Vote

What's at stake in this election? Find out using the AAUW Action Fund's Voter Issue Guide. This helpful handout provides concise information about key policy issues in the election, including the gender pay gap, family leave and paid sick days, college affordability, campus sexual violence, and reproductive rights. Use it when you table on campus, attend a town hall, or host a candidate forum. The guide even includes topical buzzwords and questions to ask candidates.

Research shows that a lack of information on the candidates and a lack of policy debates on issues of importance is the main reason some millennial women don't participate in the election process. Help combat the dearth of information.

Plan for College/University Members

A Strategic Plan to increase AAUW membership of San Antonio area colleges and universities (C/U) has been developed, with a Committee being established to focus on relationships and partnerships with local educational institutions. In highlighting the benefits of AAUW membership for faculty, staff and students, the Committee will identify key representatives to approach at each college/university – e.g., deans, associate deans and women's groups. The Committee will develop information and materials to provide to C/U representatives and seek ways to engage C/U leaders to participate actively in AAUW activities and forums. The Committee will monitor the progress in achieving these goals, present results to the AAUW SA Board of Directors, and modify the plan, as needed.

C/U members of AAUW have included San Antonio College, Palo Alto College and Our Lady of the Lake University. In addition to AAUW membership, colleges and universities would be encouraged to compete for AAUW scholarships. The work of the C/U Committee will be important in recruiting and retaining members for our SA Branch.

This election is so important for all women.

To make meaningful change, women must be part of the conversation, and the most powerful place for us to chime in is at the polls. That opportunity awaits us in just a few days, on November 6, 2018.

Politicians and policy makers routinely make decisions about issues that directly affect women and families. Those votes include our paychecks, access to reproductive health care, and education funding. Too often those running for office do not consider the impact their actions make on women and their families. That's why we need more women in office. With so much at stake as Americans head to the ballot box it's more important than ever to identify those candidates who would best represent our values as opposed to those who would roll back our rights. On the local and state level, carefully study all candidates before you go to the polls or mail in your ballot. Always vote for the qualified women and men who support your values!

Nationally the 115th Congress saw legislative victories and defeats on several issues impacting women and girls, ranging from attacks on Title IX, defunding Planned Parenthood, to bipartisan legislation increasing women's and girls' access to science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM).

AAUW.org provides a report card on how elected officials in all 50 states voted. You can visit that site at <https://www.aauwaction.org/voter-education/congressional-voting-record/>. Find Texas in both the Senate and House charts to see the names and records of your congress members. Their votes are rated from 0% to 100% on the values AAUW supports. And most of them are one of those two extremes.

Even if you voted early or by mail, you can examine this important site and pass the word along to those who are still uncertain about these important issues for the women and girls they care about. The more you research, the better voter you will be. Also, remind all your family members, wherever they live, that this election is probably the most important of their lifetime.
