Support Stronger Equal Pay Legislation

You've heard the statistics—women working full time in the United States are typically paid just 80 percent of what men are paid, and for many women of color, the gap is even wider. Despite federal and state equal pay laws, the gender pay gap persists. But congressional action can help change this.

The *Paycheck Fairness Act* would take meaningful steps to update and strengthen the *Equal Pay Act* of 1963 to help close the gender pay gap, including:

- closing loopholes that have weakened the law over time to allow employers to justify paying workers unfairly
- creating more robust remedies for those who have suffered discrimination
- preventing employers from retaliating against workers who discuss their wages

The gender pay gap is persistent and can only be addressed if women have the tools they need to challenge discrimination and employers have the incentives they need to comply with the law.

Ask your member of Congress to support the *Paycheck Fairness Act* to help close the gender pay gap!

A quick phone call to each of your senators, and your House representative could help push positive equal pay legislation in Congress. You will probably never talk with the actual members, but they all have young people who will politely take your message and pledge to pass your views to the legislator. Email and letters work too. Just get off the dime and do it!
